Rally in Las Palmas Check-In



Check-in in Las Palmas

When you arrive in Las Palmas, please visit the front desk to book a check-in appointment. We aim to check-in all yachts as soon as possible after they arrive.

At check-in, we will make sure that we have all the correct information about your boat and crew, and explain everything you need to know about your time in Las Palmas before the start of the rally. You will be given:

- A welcome pack
- Your rally identification passes
- A Rally number for your boat
- The programme of activities
- Local information on Las Palmas

Our check-in staff are multilingual, so please inform our staff if you think you would be more comfortable speaking your own language.

At check-in, a time is arranged for the onboard safety inspection - which is scheduled for 24 to 48 hours after checking in.

Safety Equipment Inspection

Safety Equipment Inspections are carried out by a Safety Inspector onboard your boat. If the boat is prepared for the inspection, this should not take more than 1 hour.

Details of the safety equipment required, as well as lots of useful advice on how to prepare for the rally, are given in the **Preparations** section pages 5-11.

Many of our Safety Inspectors are multilingual, so please inform the staff at check-in if you think you would be more comfortable completing the safety check in your own language.

Equipping your boat well in advance will save valuable time, and allow you to enjoy the many other activities going on in Las Palmas during the build up to the start. Even the most organised crews are surprised at how much time is taken up by last minute preparations!

Crew Passes

At check-in, skippers are given crew passes for the named individuals registered to crew on the boat (where fees have been paid and all required personal information is complete on the Members Area of the website). Participants must bring a passport sized photo for their pass.

They must also have their crew pass on them at all times for access to rally events.

Passes for Friends and Family

Extra passes for friends and family who wish to take part in the rally social events in Las Palmas, can be bought from the Information Centre & Shop by the skipper using their own crew pass, priced from €50.

Replacing Passes

If you lose your crew pass, replacements are available from the Information Centre & Shop for 50€. You may need ID to prove you are a rally participant.

Exchanging Passes

We do not charge to exchange a pass. However, we will only issue a new pass for free if you bring us the other pass to exchange it with.

We recommend that you arrive in Las Palmas in plenty of time to make the most of the great activities on offer and get the most out of the rally experience.

Most activities are included in the entry fee, and participants will be sent a provisional programme of activities with the email Rally Updates. It will also be posted in the Members Area of the website.

Tickets need to be purchased in advance, either online, or in the Information Centre & Shop.

Crew passes are required for all activities.

Programme Highlights

Welcome Party

An evening reception to welcome participants to Las Palmas in style. With beautiful local tapas and plenty of local wine, in a stunning local venue.

Official Opening Ceremony

Rally participants are joined by local brass bands and samba bands to make a colourful, noisy and fun procession around the perimeter of the marina during the much-loved official opening ceremony.

Participants group together in their different nationalities before the procession begins.

You can volunteer to be the flag bearer for your country at the Information Centre & Shop (flags and poles provided!).

Following speeches by local dignitaries, the many flags are raised simultaneously to stand proud until the start day.

Safety Demonstrations

Run by World Cruising Club in association with Hamble School of Yachting, the safety demonstrations play an important part in preparing you for the crossing. They are an invaluable refresher for all skippers and crew.

The safety demonstrations start with a supervised flare firing demonstration; tips on emergency evacuation and boarding a liferaft; with guided practical sessions in the Club Varadero Marítimo swimming pool.

Sundowners

These 'happy hour' drinks gatherings are held most evenings during the two-week programme of activities. Join us and meet fellow participants.

Costume Party

Every year there is a themed costume party which always delivers an evening of laughter that you won't forget. Let your imagination run away with you and have some fun in disguise! There are prizes to be won for best costume in various categories, it's a fun evening's entertainment for all the crew.

Closer to the date of the Rally you will be informed what costume theme has been chosen.

Seminars

A full programme of specialised seminars is organised in Las Palmas, designed to offer practical and informative advice for your Atlantic crossing.

These are free of charge and exclusively for rally participants.

Seminar topics covered typically include:

Downwind sailing: Setting up your boat for downwind sailing, use of preventers, guys, hull speeds and VMG.

Management of emergencies: An opportunity to think about what might go wrong and how you would handle it.

Provisioning: Advice on planning, what to buy, where to shop in Las Palmas and stowage.

Returning to Europe: Looking at all the different options for getting your boat back to Europe.

Rigging: Top tips on daily maintenance, common problems, and how to look after your rigging.

Visiting Saint Lucia: Saint Lucia Tourism Authority talk about what Saint Lucia has to offer, from beautiful bays and sandy beaches to zip wire tours, the Pitons and even a drive in volcano.

Route and Weather: Top tips from our resident meteorologist about what conditions to expect during the crossing.

Double handed sailing: A workshop for yachts with only two crew members. A great opportunity to swap ideas and discuss the logistics and apprehensions of sailing short handed. The workshop is followed by lunch.

Farewell Party

Held on the night before the start, this party is a great send-off for all crews. Drinks and beautiful local tapas served will be served during the evening.

Crew Dinners

Several crew dinners are organised at a restaurant in the Marina, a great way to enjoy a meal and meeting people from boats you may not have yet met. Booking required.

ARC Foresta Project

Since 2010, almost 3,000 native trees have been planted by rally sailors on the mountains above Las Palmas.

Managing the project is the Canaries based environmental charity Foresta. They ensure that the small trees planted by crews, will grow to become a true sustainable forest, linking areas of historic indigenous woodland to make a 'green cordon' around the mountain tops and restoring the native cloud forest eco-system.

Volunteers spend a fun half-day with Foresta, learning about the natural environment of Gran Canaria, and getting their hands dirty planting tree saplings.

The forest trip is suitable for adults and children and must be booked in advance.

Family Fun

Kids' Beach Party

An afternoon of fun games on the beach for all children under 16. A nice opportunity for children and parents to get to know each other.

Snacks and refreshments are provided. Children under 6 must be accompanied by a parent.

Family BBQ

An informal evening for all the family boats to get together, enjoy great food and chat about the adventures ahead! There's space for the kids to play and even a bouncy castle! Booking required.

Kids' Club (for children aged 6-16)

Kids' Club runs 09:00-13:30 during the week before departure, giving parents the chance to get boat jobs done.

The Club is run by a local youth activities group, who provide supervised visits to places of interest, and fun activities like paddleboarding.

Children must be registered for Kids' Club before arrival in Las Palmas - look out for details in the Rally Update emails.

Rock Painting

Although not in the official programme, rock painting has become a pre departure tradition in Las Palmas.

Get all the crew involved and leave a lasting memory of your time in Las Palmas on the rocks surrounding the marina!

Check-Out

Every boat must check out at the rally office before leaving Las Palmas.

Boats are given an allocated time and the process only takes a few minutes. It takes place before the Skippers' Briefing on the day before departure.

Yachts still waiting for crew to arrive can check-out on the morning of the start.

Skippers should come to the Rally check-out with the passports of everyone on the boat.

Border Police

Crew may need to visit the Border Police before they depart, to be stamped out of the EU. This usually applies to crew with Non-Schengen passports (except Republic of Ireland) and is applicable whether they arrived by air or yacht.

Special arrangements are made for the Border Police to attend the marina at set times during the rally.

As requirements can change, we will confirm the latest procedures during the programme in Las Palmas.

Skippers' Briefing

The briefing is held in a large venue a short walk from the marina.

At the Skippers' Briefing, we cover all the details you need to know about:

- The start line location and timings
- Up to date weather forecasts
- Sailing instructions
- Rally communications & Radio Net
- What to do when you arrive
- Final lists of all the participating yachts, their communications details, and final handicap ratings are also given out at the Skippers' Briefing.

The Start - What to Expect

The rally start is one of the most spectacular sights in the world of sailing, so make sure you look around and enjoy it!

Details of the start line and timings are explained in full at the Skippers' Briefing.

A lot of planning goes into ensuring the start goes well, with the following measures being put into place each year:

- The start line is long enough for all boats to cross safely.
- Divisions have separate start times - multihulls start separately from cruising monohulls.
- The commercial port of Las Palmas is closed for movement of all other shipping.
- The start is strictly coordinated with the full support of the Spanish Navy, the Port Authority of Las Palmas and all the emergency services.
- A very large sailing area is clearly marked with spectator boats kept at a safe distance by a fleet of RIBs.
- The whole fleet listens on one dedicated VHF channel to avoid confusion.

**All skippers must attend the skippers' briefing.
One other person from the crew may accompany the skipper.**

Final week Checklist

Don't leave refuelling to the start day!
Fill up your water tanks when you get to your berth, and top them up every day rather than waiting until the last day

Sunday

Join in the Opening Ceremony flag parade.

Monday

Order all water and drinks, using the simple pre-order drinks service.
Order cold/frozen vacuum packed meat and cheese for delivery or collection on Saturday.
Buy or refill gas bottles (see Shop).

Tuesday

Buy and store all non-fresh food.
Buy or order medicines.

Wednesday

Leave your mark in Las Palmas with a rock painting.

Thursday

Last minute boat jobs and wash down.
Pre-prepare boat meals.

Friday

Early, buy fruit and vegetables at market; wash, dry and stow carefully.
Buy other fresh produce (cheese, eggs, etc.).
Prepare fridge/freezer for tomorrow's delivery.

Saturday

Delivery or collect cold/frozen produce.
Start seasick tablets or patches.
Check-out at the allotted time.
Attend the Skippers' Briefing.
Prepare meals for the start day.
Have a relaxing evening.

Sunday

Final check-out if crew have just arrived.
Top up the water tanks.
Final crew pictures.
Have a good sail and enjoy the adventure!

Book your berth in Las Palmas Marina

All boats need to email to book a berth in Las Palmas Marina, informing them of your estimated date of arrival (ETA). Please include your boat's length overall (LOA) and beam/width.

To book your berth, please email as follows:

If you do not know your exact date of arrival you must email an approximate ETA to reserve your berth.

We recommend that you reserve your berth well in advance and can do so anytime after **1st of July**.

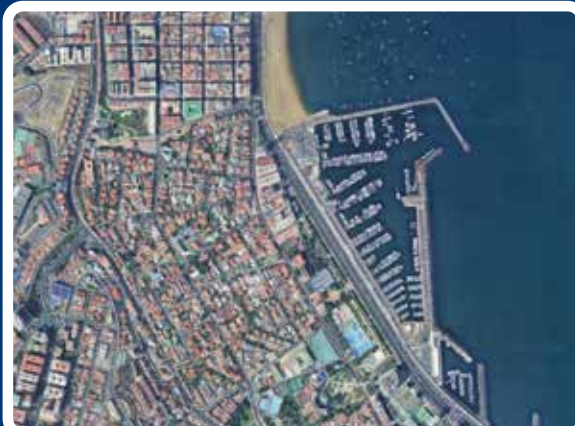
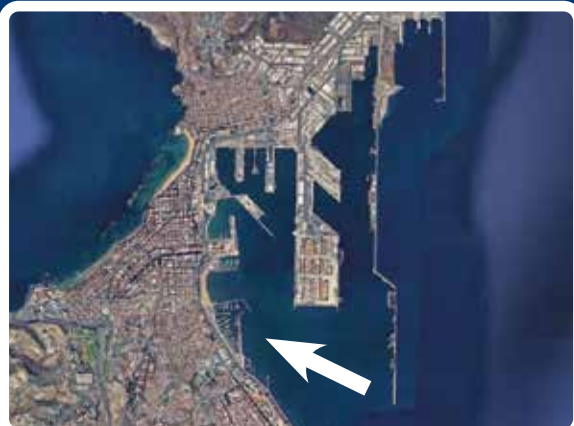
Any changes to your berth reservation must be notified to the marina without delay. The marina will charge berthing fees from the ETA date if they are not informed of a change in good time ahead of the previously notified ETA. Please also confirm your berth reservation including ETA one week before arriving.

All skippers should upload a copy of the following documents to the Members' Area of the World Cruising Club website:

1. Skipper's passport
2. Boat registration document
3. Boat insurance certificate

These will be supplied to Las Palmas Marina on your behalf. All documents must be uploaded by **30th of June**. See the **Preparations** section for further information.

Note: If you withdraw from the rally after arriving in Las Palmas, your boat will be required to vacate the marina. Berths are in high demand and not available for non-rally boats.



Approaching Las Palmas

Las Palmas Port Control:

VHF Channel 16 or 12 (monitored 24 hours)

Las Palmas Marina lies within the main commercial port of Las Palmas. For yachts approaching Gran Canaria from the north or north East, the first land to come into view is Las Isleta. The entrance to the port lies about two NM due south, and is protected by a 4km+ long breakwater.

The end of the breakwater only becomes clear when fairly close. The entrance to the port is marked by a green navigation mark which is located 500m to the south of the breakwater. You must pass to the south of this mark.

NOTE: Be aware of a smaller breakwater close to the shore, south of the marina entrance, which is well marked and lit.

There are often large commercial vessels at anchor or manoeuvring to the south and east of the port, which help to mark the position of the port, particularly when arriving from the south.

Yachts are required to make contact with Las Palmas Port Control on VHF Channel 12 at least one hour prior to arrival.

Yachts need to be aware of commercial traffic. High speed ferries also operate from the interior port. After leaving to starboard both the green flashing light at the end of long breakwater (called the 'Dique Reina Sofia') and the green flashing light on Muelle Leon y Castillo, which divides the exterior port from the interior port, yachts should make their way to the marina on the south-western side, which is protected by its own breakwaters.

The movement of all boats in the port is carefully monitored by radar and video surveillance by the Port Authority control tower, if you are in any doubt, contact Port Control on VHF Channel 12.

Entering the marina

Las Palmas Marina:

VHF Channel 11 (07:00- 22:00)

The marina entrance can be surprisingly difficult to pick out on approach, with the opening not becoming obvious until quite close in.

Before you enter the marina, you should call on VHF Channel 11. If no response proceed to the arrivals pontoon or fuel dock.

As you enter the marina, the Port Office and arrival pontoon are immediately on your port side. All yachts need to stop here and check-in at reception.

If arriving at night, come in to the marina, and tie up alongside the reception pontoon. Be aware that there may already be other boats on the pontoon and you may have to raft alongside overnight. Alternatively, yachts can anchor in the area just north of the marina entrance.

Towing

If you require a tow, contact Port Control on VHF Channel 12 when you are 2 miles off.

Assistance is only likely to be given if your position and situation is a danger to other shipping in the area. There may be a charge for this service.

Alternatively, sail to the anchorage by the entrance to Las Palmas Marina and arrange a tow in with Marina staff (during office hours.)

Entry Formalities

European Union regulations apply.

It is the skippers responsibility that immigration formalities are completed as soon as possible after arrival. Take your crew passports, boat and insurance papers to the Marina Office.

Arriving with Pets

You must declare your cat/dog or other pet when you arrive in Las Palmas.

Spain is a member of the EU-wide Pet Travel scheme (PETS). This requires all animals to have a pet passport, a current health certificate, valid rabies vaccination certificate, be microchipped for identification and to have been blood tested by a recognised veterinarian prior to arrival. You will need to take along your sanitary certificate issued by the vet. Please ensure you are aware of the requirements of this BEFORE arriving in Las Palmas.

Arrival Checklist

1. Report to the Marina Office on arrival. Check in at the marina reception where you will be allocated your berth.
2. Fill up with fuel. The fuel dock is located near the reception pontoon. Don't wait until start day to fill your tanks.
3. Make your way to your allocated berth. Most berths up to 24m have permanent sinker lines taken to the pontoons and these can be picked up with a boat hook when approaching the berth. Boats over 24m may need to use their own anchor.
4. Complete required clearance formalities. If arriving from outside the EU visit immigration and port authorities to obtain clearance.
5. Book a check-in at the ARC+ Office. The ARC+ Offices are located half way along the western side of the marina opposite Sailors Bar.

Marina Facilities

Las Palmas Marina (or Muelle Deportivo) is completely separate from the commercial harbour, and within walking distance to the city centre. Many services are available on-site, including chandleries, boat yard and small grocery stores. (see A to Z of Marine Services).

It is important to remember that Las Palmas Marina is a public marina, and berth owners do not generally live on their boats. This means that facilities, although sufficient and clean, are not of the high standard found in many private European marinas.

There are several good quality bars and restaurants located along the western wall of the marina.

The marina charges all visitors for pontoon access cards. These are 5€ for stays <1 month, and 10€ per month for longer stays 1-6 months and are issued by the marina office.

ARC+ Shuttle Bus

A free shuttle bus service around the marina operates Mon-Sat during the programme, simply flag it down.

Marina Charges Explained

Las Palmas is a public marina, affected by several local and national pricing laws, which might result in you getting three separate invoices (Berth Tax, Navigation Aids Tax, and Water/Electricity).

The amount charged to you is calculated using the area of your boat in square metres (length x width), multiplied by the stern-to or alongside rate. The fee is charged by day, not by night. This means that one night stay may be charged at two days. Prices are significantly less than those charged by many privately owned marinas. To calculate your rates see: marina.palmasport.es/calculator

Current rates (at February 2025):

Berth Tax and Navigation Tax:

Stern-to berths: €0.17 / day / m²

Alongside berths: €0.418 / day / m²

Daily Water & Electricity charges:

LOA 10-15m: €1.55

LOA 15-20m: €2.31 + 7% IGIC

LOA 20-25m: €3.08

Monthly Water & Electricity charges:

LOA 10-15m: €15.42

LOA 15-20m: €23.13 + 7% IGIC

LOA 20-25m: €30.83

Larger yachts (normally those over 65ft) berthing along the Eastern Wall ('Dique Este') are charged by usage:

Water: €4.62 x m³ & Electricity: €0.18 x kw/h + 3% IGIC

Example cost:

14m monohull with 3.5m width (= 49m² area), staying for 2 weeks berthed stern-to:

Berth Tax + Navigation Tax: 49m² x 14 days x €0.17 = €116.62

Water & Electricity: €1.55 x 14 days = 21.70 + 7% IGIC = €23.22

Total cost = €139.48

Showers

The permanent shower and toilet facilities in the marina are open 24 hours and can be accessed with magnetic key cards available from the marina office. Showers are serviced regularly every day, but, please advise the Marina Office staff immediately if the toilets or showers require attention.

Showers are located next to the fuel dock, opposite the Information Centre & Shop, in the Vela Latina area, and near to the northern exit ramp.

Dressing Your Boat

All rally yachts are asked to dress their boat with flags whilst in harbour, to create a festive atmosphere! Use a set of code flags and any special boat flags and your rally flag. Code flags can be purchased from worldcruising.com

Don't forget to fly your rally and Gran Canaria flags too!

Marina Security

Las Palmas Marina is a public marina with security provided by Las Palmas Port Police. The pontoons have lockable gates, but these are often left open by crew, so do not rely on this for security.

Lock your boat, and do not leave anything of value on deck or on the pontoon. If you have dinghies/ bicycles/scooters etc. ensure they are padlocked to the boat.

At the northern end of the Muelle Deportivo is an exit ramp, which is closed overnight. The main exit at the southern end of the marina is open 24 hours. Security patrols are normally more frequent at night.

Leaving your Boat

If you intend to leave your boat unattended in Las Palmas for a period of time, please make this clear to the marina staff and include details in your email to the marina reserving your berth.

We strongly recommend you explore the guardinage services available locally via chandleries and live-aboards. Also consider fitting an alarm, movement detector and light; and if possible, pull your boat away from the dock making it more difficult to board. We would also recommend telling the neighbouring boats of your plans.

Las Palmas Marina FAQs

Can I book a berth in advance?

Yes. You MUST contact the marina in advance with your ETA and requirements following the process outlined on page 9.

How are berths allocated in Las Palmas?

Berthing is allocated by the marina by size and arrival date. The largest monohulls (20m+ in length) are normally assigned berths stern-to, on the wall (Dique Este). The remaining fleet are berthed throughout the marina. Multihulls can be berthed in the Vela Latina basin, at the southern end of the marina.

Will I be rafted onto another boat?

This is a large marina, and each year room is made for the arrival of the whole fleet. Rafting up is not normally needed.

I have children onboard. Will families be berthed together?

As much as possible yes, depending on the size of boat and date of arrival. Multihulls with families cannot always be berthed with monohulls.

Is the water on the docks in Las Palmas Marina safe to drink?

Yes - tap water on Gran Canaria is desalinated and considered safe to drink.

If I want to go day sailing after I arrive, will my pontoon place be reserved?

Yes.

What happens if I withdraw from the rally?

If you withdraw from the rally after arriving in Las Palmas, your boat will be required to vacate the marina.

Do the pontoons have security gates?

Yes - you will need to purchase magnetic marina access card from the marina office - 5€ for stays <1 month, and 10€ per month for longer stays

How do you access the shower and toilets?

You will need to use your marina access card to access the facilities.



A to Z of Boat Services

Repair facilities on Gran Canaria are the best to be found in the Canary Islands, and most work can be carried out here. As local workshops are used to dealing with foreign yachts, some have been tempted to overcharge: Always insist on an estimate before any work is started and agree on the price and scope of work in writing.

The biggest concentration of workshops is in Urbanización El Sebadal, a large industrial estate on the peninsula north of the commercial harbour. There is normally a call out fee for any specialist called to a yacht, however large or small the job.

Keep us updated

The companies listed here have all been discoveries and recommendations of former ARC+ and ARC participants.

We try to keep the list updated as much as possible, but if you find new services in the city which you can recommend, or are disappointed by the service or level of work from any company listed here, please help future participants and let us know.

Plan Ahead

The repair services in Las Palmas are under a great deal of pressure during the rally and on the whole are slow to respond once the marina starts filling up with boats.

To get a job done promptly and efficiently we strongly recommend you arrive in plenty of time and book services in advance.

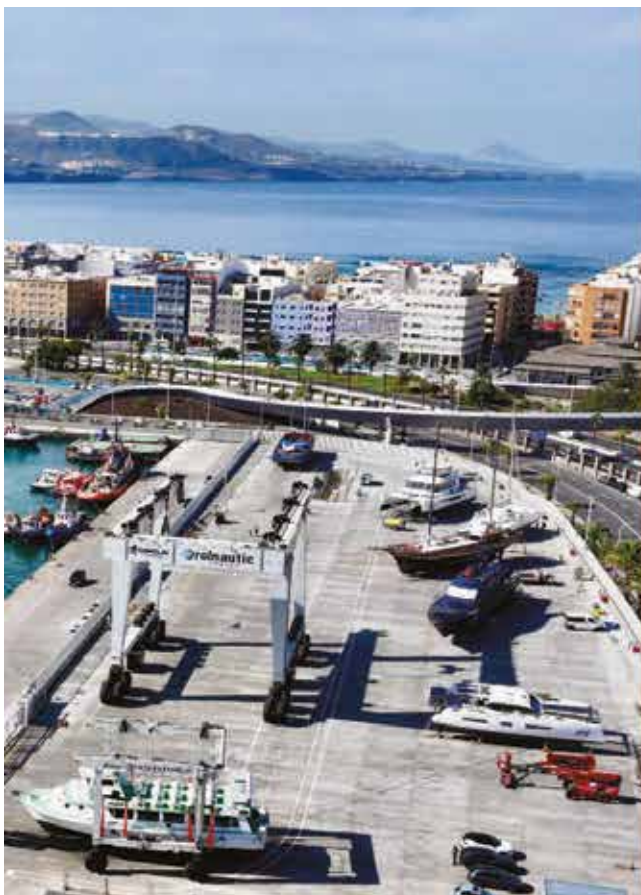

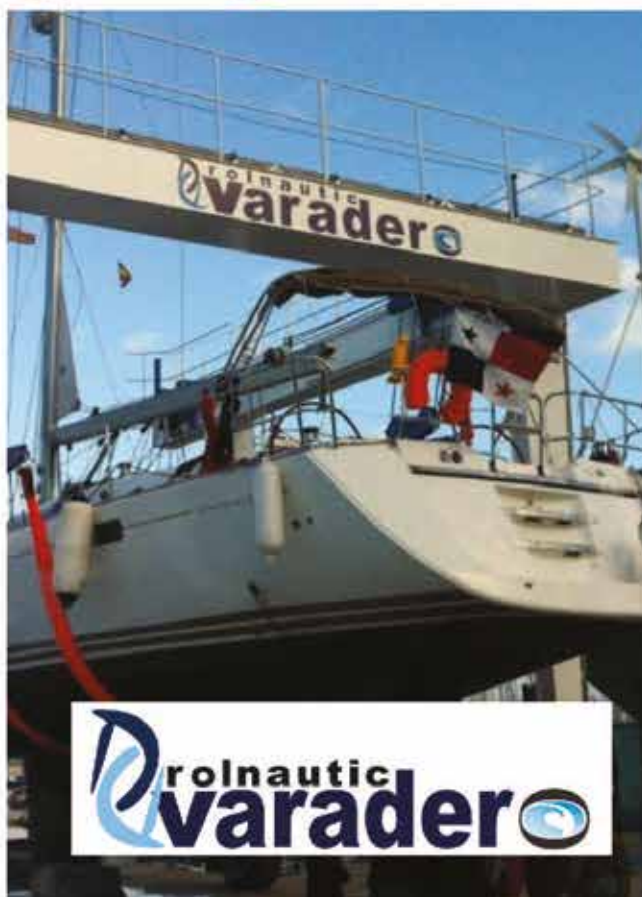

Sending Mail and Packages to Las Palmas

IMPORTANT - Please read the following information carefully before considering getting parcels or mail delivered to you in Las Palmas. It is vitally important you follow these instructions to select the most suitable method of post to minimise delays and prevent unexpected costs.

Import Regulations

Sending packages to Las Palmas takes more time than sending to other parts of Europe. It can also be more expensive, because you may have to pay additional customs payments.

The Canary Islands are part of Spain and a part of the European Union customs territory, but are subject to a different tax system (IGIC), which means all items are subject to customs clearances. This means that the sender **MUST** attach a Customs Invoice for ALL items shipped to the Canary Islands.

To ensure parcels are delivered correctly the Customs Invoice **MUST** contain the following information and be clearly displayed on the parcel:

- Description of the item/s being shipped
- The value of the shipped goods
- Full, correct delivery address
- Recipients email address
- Recipients telephone number
- Mark for 'Yacht in Transit'
- Included yacht registration number.

Ensure the person/company sending the parcel puts the correct address and information on the package.

Incorrect details on an item's address, invoice, or other paperwork will delay its release from customs, or it may not reach Gran Canaria at all.

Dangerous Goods

Items that are classed as IATA dangerous goods can't be sent to Las Palmas. These include but not limited to: aerosols, batteries of any kind, lifesaving equipment, fuels of any kind, cleaning products, parts containing oils or fuels, or used parts, flares, paint and pharmaceuticals.

Medical kits and medical devices cannot be accepted as they require Import Permits. Items such as these will need to be purchased in Las Palmas, see Local Information from page 24 for pharmacies, or ensure you buy items before leaving your home port.

IMPORTANT - The Marina Office will NOT accept goods on behalf of visiting yachts.

Size

Parts over 200cm long, 100cm wide, or over 65cm high cannot be accepted on the flights into Las Palmas, as they are too big for the aircraft operating.

If you send an item to the marina office using a regular post service or courier, it will be sent back to their local office in Las Palmas for a period (typically up to 30 days).

You will then have to make contact with them and chase it – which will be complicated and time-consuming. For regular post, items may be held at the Oficina de Correos P.º Cayetano de Lugo, 21. The closest post office to the marina.

The ARC EORI NR. is ESN8266034A - this can only be used when there is a physical presence in the office in Las Palmas de Gran Canaria from 28 October 2026.

IMPORTANT - Any items sent that use this EORI number that arrive before the ARC+ Office opens will be returned to origin at the sender's expense by the courier.

Using a regular post service (Royal Mail, Correos, Deutsche Post etc)

If the mail is small, light, or not urgent - You can use the normal mail system ensuring the item is labelled correctly and is accompanied by a completed electronic CN22/CN23 document (These forms are available for you to download on the website of the national postal service in your country).

You will need to include the following information on your package:

- Contents
- Value
- Recipient contact telephone number
- Return address
- Details of sender/exporter
- Description and value of product in the invoice

Plus any additional information requested by the mail service you are using.

When you print out the shipping labels and customs documents, both will need to be secured to the parcel. Place the customs documents in a clear envelope or plastic wallet and attach them to the outside of the box, so that they can easily be checked upon arrival into the Canary Islands.

If an item requires additional customs clearance processing, the recipient will be contacted to authorise the Spanish Post (Correos) to carry out the import of the item on their behalf (or nominate a customs agent).

Make sure the details on the invoice reflect the true value of the item. The taxes and management charges will be calculated from this value, so avoid unnecessarily rounding up the value.

Courier Companies

Most global courier companies are managed locally by franchise businesses, which means their service can be inconsistent in different parts of the world. Our recommendations - based on recent experience and feedback from our staff and participants are:

DHL have been the most reliable courier.

FedEx process Customs clearance in Madrid, which can make deliveries complicated and delayed.

UPS least reliable in recent years.

Courier companies do not manage the Customs process and therefore may give you an (often expensive and unexpected) invoice to pay when you collect your item in Las Palmas.

Customs Agents

If the item you are sending is heavy, large, valuable or urgent, a customs agent should be used.

Agencia de Aduanas Pedro Lopez has been assisting rally participants for many years as a local customs agent in Las Palmas. They will manage the Customs delivery process so that you may not have to pay expensive Customs import taxes - which regular courier companies will not do, avoiding an unexpected invoice to pay when you collect your item.

Agencia de Aduanas Pedro Lopez should be contacted in advance of sending the package and will provide detailed guidance on how the accompanying paperwork should be completed. For the majority of parcels, you will need to prepare a commercial invoice describing the contents, which should include origin country and value, and then attach it to your consignment required by Canary Islands' Customs Authorities.

If you fail to do so, then they will return the consignment. Make sure the details on the invoice reflect the true value of the item.

Agencia de Aduanas Pedro Lopez typically charge a minimum of €60 as the cost of endorsement and payment must be made in cash.

Buses

The city bus service provides several bus routes to take you from one end of Las Palmas to the other, whilst the Global (Utinsa and Salcai) bus lines have routes covering the whole of the island guaguasglobal.com

From the airport there are regular buses to the marina which will take about half an hour (longer at peak traffic times). Use Bus No 60 and alight at Juan XXIII. Bus No 12 (fast) and No 1 (stopping) link the two parts of Las Palmas. The nearest bus stop is on the main road outside the marina and the routes run all the way into the city centre, while in the other direction (south) it stops near the Central Bus Station (Estación de Guaguas Municipales).

Ask in the Information Centre & Shop for a timetable and route map.

Tickets for city buses can be bought from the driver at a flat rate of €1.40 approx for a single ticket. Or you can buy a ticket valid for one journey ("Bono guagua"), at a reduced price, available from local kiosks and supermarkets.

As the official vehicle rental supplier for the ARC+, local supporters Dolar Rent a Car are the only company that are permitted to operate from Las Palmas Marina during the rally, and you'll find their helpful staff positioned in the Information Centre & Shop every day. Their vehicles can be collected from the airport on arrival, and you can conveniently leave your car in the marina at the end of your rental.

Driving Directions from Las Palmas Airport to the marina

It is a fairly easy 35 minute drive from the airport to the marina. Leaving the airport, follow signs north for Las Palmas. The main highway follows the coast all the way up. Turn off when you see a green sign saying 'Avda Juan XXIII'. You will see the marina directly below you on your right – As you turn off, turn immediately west (round the white monument roundabout, then after 100m or so, follow the one way system back round to your right. The main entrance to the marina (Muelle Deportivo) is just ahead, on the right at the T-junction.

The marina is known locally as the Muelle Deportivo (pronounced 'mwee-ay deporteevo').

Sailing

Sailing between the islands is a great way to get some overnight practice in before the rally starts if you have time! Winds are generally from the northeast, making it a relatively smooth overnight run down to Las Palmas from Fuerteventura or Lanzarote (about 110 miles).

Useful Spanish Words

Advice for speaking Spanish

In general, Spanish words are all pronounced phonetically - exactly as they look. The accent falls on the second-to-last syllable, unless there are accented letters in the word. Double L (ll) is always pronounced 'y', and the letter 'j' sounds more like the English 'g', said from the back of the throat.

The Canarian accent sounds almost more Cuban than it does the Spanish of mainland Spain, and you will be loved by the locals for saying the word for 'thank you' ('gracias'), pronouncing the 'c' more like a 'z', instead of saying it 'grathias'. The Canarians are very patient and appreciative of people who try to speak a few words of their language, so take it slowly and give it a go. Many of the ARC+ staff in Las Palmas are multi-lingual, and several are fluent in Spanish, so if you need help don't hesitate to ask.
